Molly lived for HAAG, it was like a lifeline for her. It generated her enthusiasm and a strong will to live to further her cause for Social Justice especially when it came to homelessness and housing for older people – and especially for older women.

Only weeks before her death Molly had been celebrating "Seniors Week" and told us in no uncertain terms that she had just had "one of the best days in her life", demonstrating for a "Fair Go for Pensioners", commandeering a tram, and talking to the young school children about "Older People" and their rights!

Molly was fearless when it came to "pushing" HAAGs cause and there was many a politician left "quivering" when Molly stood to ask a question! During Molly's time with HAAG she was able to witness its growth due the amazing research & the development of policy by the committee of management. She saw the implementation of these policies and further research by the committed staff who included Jeff Fiedler (whom Molly adored) and April Bragg.

No family discussion ever took place without their names being mentioned.

In the 10 years since, how proud Molly would be to see HAAG operating on a national level.

She would love to still be calling in for a "cuppa" and a chat with Fiona and the fabulous HAAG Team discussing the latest developments and I can hear here saying "so where do we go from here" – she was always looking ahead!

Congratulations to everyone at HAAG for your ongoing commitment to the ideals that were first put forward all those years ago by Molly and her comrades seeking equality and housing for all.

Aged Care System Navigator trial

In 2018, HAAG became one of the "trial sites" for a new program to assist older people to connect with My Aged Care, by providing one-on-one support and information sessions to the public about the aged care system, what's available and how to access it. This was part of a national trial, led by COTA Australia, and HAAG was the only trial site that had a focus on people at risk of homelessness. We used our team of bilingual volunteers to reach vulnerable older people and had great success in connecting many people with services who would not otherwise have known where to go for help.

In 2020 the trial was extended, and based on an evaluation of the service, shifted focus away from information sessions to the general public towards more intensive and tailored support for people who were "falling through the gaps" – especially people from non-English speaking backgrounds, people without secure housing and people who have experienced

past trauma. Our System Navigator service consistently went above and beyond all the other trial sites in the country by reaching some of the most vulnerable people through targeted information and working closely with our housing support service.


In the last year, our service had a higher number of "band 3" – that is, the people with the highest needs – than any other site. We assisted 180 older people, their families and carers to navigate the complicated aged care system – 145 people came through our Home at Last service, and 22 came through our bilingual volunteers – meaning that most people supported were either from CALD backgrounds or at risk of homelessness.

On 31 December 2022, the Aged Care System Navigator trial comes to an end. A new "carefinder" service will take its place, and who receives funding to do this important work will be decided by the Primary Health Networks, commissioned by the Federal Government.

Despite our proven success in delivering this service, and reaching the most vulnerable people to connect them with aged care and other supports, we may not be funded to do this work.

Assistance with Care and Housing

The other program that is finishing and being replaced by the new "carefinder" service is the long-standing and successful Assistance with Care and Housing

program. This program has been running since the 1990s and has consistently provided support to older people at risk of homelessness to access and maintain their housing. Existing ACH providers, like HAAG, will become "carefinders" and have the same amount of funding "guaranteed" until the middle of 2025. But the focus of the new service is not housing and homelessness but aged care. We have spent the last year fighting hard to keep the housing focus in the new guidelines, but we have grave fears that this will be lost as new providers with no experience in housing and homelessness come in, and long-term providers are leaving.

The Department will no longer have oversight of the program, as it has been "farmed out" to the Primary Health Networks, who are making the decision on who is funded and who is not.

At a time when the housing crisis for older people is getting worse, it does not seem like a good idea to dismantle long running and successful programs that support older people at risk of homelessness. But only time will tell.

A new working group for older renters

HAAG is thinking about starting a working group for older renters who'd like to improve conditions in rental housing. At the moment we have the Retirement Accommodation Action Group working on issues in retirement villages and residential park, but we haven't had a group to deal with the issues that are common in private rental and public and community housing. With rents rising across the state, it's past time we started organising for better rights and protections for older tenants.

After looking through our membership data published in the last edition of Older Tenant's Voice, and noticing that so many HAAG members live in private rental, as well as renting in Public and Community Housing, we hope that members will want to get more involved in a working group that specifically represents their housing situation.

So we want to hear from you! Would you want to be involved? If so, are meetings in person or online better? What should the group focus on?

"Lady in the Van" (2015) is the "mostly true" story of an older homeless woman who imposes herself on the well-to-do neighbourhood of Camden in London in the 1970's..

Miss Shepherd is an 'educated woman' with a colourful past. Once a concert pianist, then a nun, she is racked by a full blown Catholic guilt of a car accident, and the paranoia that the police are after her.

Her ungodly stench is quite exaggeratedly drawn attention to throughout the movie, an overblown and childish stereotype. However the eccentricities of her character and Maggie Smith's make the Lady in the Van more than a two dimensional story.

The real stench that Miss Shepherd brings to the neighbourhood is the visual reminder of poverty, and of ageing than she brings to the street of young middle class professionals. She refuses to be moved along or be made invisible, instead painting her van bright yellow, making her presence known.



For Alan Bennet (Alex Jennings), a single, gay playwright who has just moved into the neighbourhood, she is a reminder of his guilt about his own mother, who he has abandoned to an old people's home. He is in two minds about allowing the lady to park in his driveway. He is portrayed by two versions of himself, the writer and the real life person, a clunky device that makes it seem like he is in a relationship with himself. It is also vaguely suggested that he is sleeping with younger actors who visit his home, to the displeasure of Miss Shepherd. The coyness with which the film addresses homosexuality makes it seem like this film was made in 1970, not 2015. The clash of morality between the generous, gay, modern playwright, and the rude, Catholic, old fashioned Miss Shepherd is a theme of the movie, but the conflict isn't brought to the fore.

Miss Shepherds' unpleasant disposition might make audiences feel as though she 'chose' to be in such a situation, but as she explains to Alan, "I didn't choose - I was chosen". The tragic situation that led to her becoming homeless is also shown to be a product of a society who look away from and reject women like her, despite her being a loyal monarchist, god-fearing, and educated woman. ** Reuben Endean
